Hi, All You Trail Riders!

A new season of trail riding is upon us and we all hope to enjoy our wonderful trails and lovely countryside again, whether it be merely for a short jaunt on a weekend or a longer day or overnight ride, or even on pack trips into the mountains, we should abide by trail etiquette and simple rules, and especially help our youngsters to learn and understand them. As more and more people settle in our beautiful state, and more property is built up, we have to learn and try to understand the viewpoint of those people who never have been near a horse and don't enjoy the dust we sometimes make, and also be more considerate of our good neighbors who are so willing and so very helpful to let us through their property. Your trail committee has worked out a system this year, whereby organized Trail rides and their routes, should be cleared with the Trail Captain before a ride. For this reason the different organizations have appointed the following:

Woodside Trail Club: Sam Campbell.

Menlo Circus Club: Gordon Coryell.

San Mateo County Horsemens Association: Toots Lopez.

Mounted Patrol: (Will be announced later).

This means that those people will get in touch with the property owners in advance, through whose property the respective group intends to ride. If for any reason a property owner does not wish the group to ride through, then the respective Trail Captain has to find a different route. We hope this system will work out satisfactorily for all concerned, and it will, with your cooperation. We wish to point out that it is very important to follow these rules, as otherwise we will find ourselves along roads only, as it will be extremely hard for your Trail committee to get new Trails approved.

The following rules should be remembered and always adhered to by all riders, and for the public stables, it would be a good idea to hang such rules in conspicious places where they can be easily read.

"Never smoke on horseback on the trail, make a smoke stop and dismount. One good fire and we'll be out for good.

Always close and lock gate, or leave gates the way you find them, you may deny some cattle water in the next pasture.

Never take your dog along on a ride, it makes no difference how well behaved he is, you will encounter other dogs on their home grounds, and they resent the instrusion.

Always stay on established Trails, don't ride across a field, it may be seeded, and don't gallop past a group of riders, it makes their horses nervous and spoils the riders pleasant day.

Never ride too close behind the horse in front of you, and should your horse be inclined to kick, in a group, tie a red ribbon on his tail for a warning.

If you encounter hikers on a trail, which will probably happen more and more, try to get to the side and let them pass, as most people seem to be uncertain of horses.

If you encounter new construction of any kind, such as paving, grading, etc. stay off the new work, please.

Always pass single file along the edge.

In 1944, during the administration of Creed Haberlin, it was decided by vote to discontinue the old "Pink Shirt" and print a four to eight page magazine complete with pictures, articles and a nice cover picture. A contest was held to select a suitable name. At the December meeting, a committee appointed by President Creed selected the name "The San Matco Horseman." Verna Louw suggested this name and won the prize—a beautiful painting done and appropriately presented by Harry Tyrell.

I have before me now, Volume I, No. 1, January, 1945, of the "San Mateo Horseman" and a very fine magazine it is but it was expensive. This was continued until 1954. Increasing costs, as well as lack of news or editorial material, forced your Association to abandon a regular magazine and go back to a mimeographed sheet.

When in a moment of weakness I agreed to handle the magazine for 1958, a number of people expressed a wish for a bigger, nicer looking magazine than was possible with a mimeographed copy. They felt and I agree—that our SMCHA, one of the largest groups in the state, was not justly represented.

Costs and printing estimates were obtained. The matter was brought up before the Board Meeting on February 7. It was a good fight while it lasted and your Board voted to try this "new look" for three months anyway, so definite costs—and your reaction—can be obtained. Let us know how you like it!

Honor To The Juniors

Last year the Directors of the American Horse Shows Association called on the management of all shows for a marked improvement in the observance of the rules and inaugurated an Honor List as a reward, with a Committee on Show Violations to review the prize list and catalogue of every show, as well as the report of the ASHA Steward.

It is the duty of the Committee to make up an Annual Honor List of recognized shows whose managements have not committed or permitted a major violation or a serious minor violation of the rules.

There were 362 recognized shows held during the year 1957 and of this number only 10 rated the Honor Show Award.

It is, with a great feeling of pride, that we tell you that the San Mateo County Junior Horse Show received the honor of being one of the ten. The award was not

THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEET-ING OF THE SMCHA on February 7 was exceptionally well attended. To get your magazine to you before our next general meeting, we'll just have to give you the highlights from memory as we will not have time to wait for the minutes.

The "hottest" debate was over the magazine. Bill Louw, who is handling the magazine for 1958, wanted to put out a bigger and better appearing magazine than the mimeographed copy issued the last couple of years, but not as elaborate as the original eight page "San Mateo Horseman." Costs were discussed and it was decided to try the new, printed magazine for three months and see how it was received and what it would cost.

Al Williams, Horse Show Chairman, asked that the Association take steps to have their own jumps made for the horse shows. This was given the O.K. with a cost limit.

Herb Huettig, Trail Chairman, urged all horse owners who stable their horses on their own property, to sccure stable permits from the Planning Commission. Costs only \$2.00 per year per horse and it keeps you legally in the clear. If horse owners do not do this voluntarily, and it is necessary to police the county to register these private stables, the cost could jump to at least \$6.00 per year per head.

Alice Wallace read a detailed report from a committee appointed to study suggested changes in the Juniors, because of the various age groups within this organization. This caused a lengthy debate and was finally referred back to the committee for further study. Jerry Schromm was named to head this committee.

This isn't a very formal report, but it is the best we can do from memory!—Ed.

Essential Saddling Rules

1. Be sure your horse has a healthy clean back. (Try your vacuum cleaner on him once in awhile if he's not the type that puts his front feet in your vest pocket.)

2. Use plenty of clean padding under the saddle, and remember the **cleanest** side should be next to the horse, even if, it doesn't look as pretty that way.

3. Be sure saddle fits horse; if not, change one or the other, but don't try to make your horse fit the saddle. Remember that any rig should clear the backbone area by at least an inch and this includes the withers. Be sure this clearance is maintained after you're in the saddle, too. Remember, the larger the rider, the larger the saddle bearing pressure should be, and that saddle pressure should be distributed uniformly over the back area.

4. Before cinching up, always run your hand under the blanket where the saddle torks at the withers to form an airspace so that when the girth is tightened, the horse won't feel a binding pressure from a tight blanket. After cinching up, carefully pull each foreleg forward so that all skin fold will clear the cinch area, especially just back of the elbow. This helps to prevent cinch sores, and helps you to stay on after you get on. Many a rider has been unloaded because of what he calls a "burr under the blanket" when all he had was a horse that resented a blanket binding his withers and/or his skin being pinched from a cinch.

5. The object of a cinch is to aid in keeping the saddle on the horse, not to cut the horse in two. If your cinch is too short, just invest in a longer one. It's cheaper than trying to divide the horse, and much safer.

6. If your saddle keeps slipping back, try more padding; if that doesn't work, just whip down and purchase a breast collar. It's a fine useful piece of equipment and may be decorative as well.

7. After cinching and before mounting your horse, walk him a few steps and then tighten your cinch if necessary. This helps to relax him a little, and gives you time to read all these rules and see if you left anything out.
