
Horse Show

The San Mateo County Horsemen's Association 11th Annual Open Horse Show will be held on June 17th and 18th, 1961 at the Mounted Patrol Grounds in Woodside, California. This year's show will be approved by the American Horse Shows Association and the California Reined Cow Horse Association, Many of you may be asking what makes an approved show. The answer is simply that in order to have a show approved by an Association (in this case the American Horse Shows Association and the California Reined Cow Horse Association) you have to live up to their specifications and rules. This takes more time and expense but the results are rewarding both to the exhibitors and to the association sponsoring the show.

Exhibitors approve this type of show because they are given rating points for national placing in many different catagories such as jumping, hunting, stock, trail, equitation, etc. For this reason many top exhibitors will go hundreds of miles to a small approved show rather than to a bigger unapproved show. A good example of this was our last year's open horse show. Many top exhibitors such as Don Dodge, Red Randall, Tony Amaral and Eddie Brazil by-passed the large Reno, Nevada show, which offered many fine saddles and bits as prizes, to attend the San Mateo County Horsemen's Association show on Saturday and Sunday. The reason for this, we repeat, was that the contestants had a chance to get points at our show.

Last year we had entries from Barbara

Introducing the CANADA STABLES

Canada Stables, for many years operated as Rohn Stables at 896 Canada Road, Woodside, was leased January 1, 1961 by Arabian Mounted Patrol, Inc., from John and Florence Brown. At the same time Islam Shrine Mounted Patrol announced it would make its headquarters at Canada Stables. Several of the beautiful gray registered Arabian horses of Islam Mounted Patrol now occupy box stalls there. The balance of the Islam horses will be brought in during the next year. All drills conducted by Islam Mounted Patrol are being held at Canada Stables.

Canada Stables, in addition to caring for the Islam horses, provides for boarding horses for the general public in corrals, tie stalls or box stalls. The stable is particularly popular because of the immediate access to the beautiful trails in Woodside, Huddart Park, and the San Francisco water district.

Canada Stables continues to operate a riding school with Mr. John Melville as the instructor. Lessons in either English or Western are available to people in all age brackets.

Canada Stables, formerly known as Rohn Stables, was established by the late M. F. Rohn and Mrs. Rohn about 1948 and was acquired by Mr. and Mrs. Brown about 1956.

Islam Mounted Patrol was established

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in 1954 by a small group including Warren Jones of Woodside, who served as Captain from 1955 through 1957. The late Clair E. Silliman, also of Woodside, served as Captain by appointment of Potentate Willard J. Classen of Woodside in 1958. C. H. Reifenrath of Redwood City, served as Captain during 1959 and 1960 and L. A. Loustau of Woodside became Captain in January, 1961. Other current officers include: Cecil L. Ball, San Carlos, 1st Lieutenant; John M. Moore, San Carlos, 2nd Lieutenant; A. S. Kayser, Menlo Park, Adjutant; and Earl Helsel, Redwood City, Quartermaster.

Over the years, Islam Mounted Patrol has participated in parades in San Francisco, Oakland, Sacramento, Fresno, San Jose, Redwood City, Palo Alto, Paso Robles, Los Angeles, Reno, Nevada and Albuquerque, New Mexico. It is scheduled to go to Salt Lake City, Utah, in June.

The Arabian Mounted Patrol, Inc., lessees of the stable property, became the owner of the Rohn dwelling in March, 1961. Officers and directors of the Corporation are: C. H. Reifenrath, President; Charles S. Blair, Vice-President; and L. A. Loustau, Secretary-Treasurer,

L. R. "Pat" Linfoot of Woodside is general manager and Jordan Thompson, San Francisco, Quartermaster.

Considerable grading has recently been finished to over come drainage problems and for better utilization of the area.

Future plans include lighting of the ring to provide Islam Mounted Patrol the facility of night drills.

Although rental strings were maintained for several years, the new organization has eliminated this portion of the operation.

Alterations and changes, which have been made to date, have been designed for the greatest possible safety of riders and animals.

Many thanks, everyone, it was a lot of fun.



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PERSONALITY of the Month!

HOWARD E. MARKS

Howard was born in Dos Palos, California and was raised on a dairy ranch. His parents operated one of the first, large dairy ranches in that area. It was here that Howard's "early rising" pattern was set. Horses and cattle played a great part in his early training and his affection for livestock was to remain with him into his adult years.

After graduating from the local schools, Howard continued his education at Heald's Engineering School in San Francisco.

1924 proved to be a banner year for Howard. He met and married Ruth and they have three lovely daughters, Marjorie, Greta and Patricia. At present, they have eight much-loved grandchildren.

Also in 1924 he joined his father and brother in the Frank B. Marks and Sons Company, producers of rock products. His father started the business in 1908, when the loading of gravel onto railroad cars was done by hand. Gradually they advanced to loading with mule teams and "slip-scrapers." In the early twenties they became mechanized and tractors took over. They also built roads and highways through the valley areas and in national and state parks. The original plant at Newman, California is now operated by Howard's brother, Frank B. Marks, Jr. In 1929 Howard moved to Tracy, California where a new plant was established. In 1945 he purchased a large ranch in Tracy and started to develop his now-successful business of raising registered Polled Hereford cattle and registered purebred Arabian horses. This is one of the outstanding cattle and horse ranches in the western states.
