

MEMORIES OF SMCHA (1963 and '64)

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1963 and '64 were good years for SMCHA. The general meetings were held at the Veteran's Memorial Building in Redwood City. It is interesting to recall that one of the early Director's Meetings in 1963 was a dinner held at Mel's Bowl in Redwood City.

Harry Zaban, or "Hank" as he was known, was installed as SMCHA's President in 1963 at the San Mateo Elks Lodge. Master of Ceremonies and Installing Officer was the Association's 1960 President, the late Jim Menefee.

Hank is well remembered for his black and white pinto, Tequila. Hank and Tequila only missed one Redwood City July 4th Parade in twenty years. Their last parade was in 1978 when Tequila, then thirty-six, chose to take life easier and rode in a decorated U-Haul truck. It was Tequila's last parade. Tequila passed away quietly in his stall the following Christmas. Hank and Tequila were both members of the Aahmes Shrine Mounted Patrol of Oakland.

Ray Barbera, the Association's 1964 President, was installed at the Redwood City Elks Lodge. The 1964 Master of Ceremonies and Installing Officer was the late Bob Stallings, then County Manager.

Hank was a native of Atlanta, Georgia. Ray was born in Lowell, Massachusetts. Both have saddled up for that ride to the great sky country. Ray died September 15, 1980. Hank died March 17, 1981.

In 1963, SMCHA won the Best Senior Mounted Group in the Redwood City July 4th Parade. Presentation of the trophy was made at the rodeo that followed. 1963 was the last year for the famous Redwood City Rodeo.

A worthwhile event of the year was the White Elephant Auction held at one of the general meetings. The auction raised over \$400 for the blind children's "Enchanted Program."

A pleasant event of the year was the September joint family ride between the Mounted Patrol and the SMCHA. The riders assembled at the home of Richard Delucci in Woodside. Richard was the Association's 1948 President and in 1963 served as Captain of the Mounted Patrol.

The event of 1963 to be well remembered was the presentation to the Association of a fifty-star flag that had flown over the U.S. Capitol Building in Washington D.C.. The presentation was made by T. Louis Chess, then County Supervisor. The presentation was pictured on the front of the San Mateo Horseman in the November, 1963 issue. The flag was a gift from Congressman J. Arthur Younger.

A great activity still existing in 1963 and '64 was the William Byrne Futurity. The first futurity was held in 1945 in Atherton at what was then the Lockwood Estate. The idea for the colt futurity was Bill Byrne's and was named after him.

Still existing in Woodside in those years was the Play Pen. The Play Pen was the headquarters for the Los Altos Hunt. The Play Pen closed in 1971 and the Hunt Headquarters moved to Placinas.

A well-enjoyed social event of 1964 was the "Roaring Twenties" dinner dance in the banquet room at the top of the Woodside Pioneer Hotel. Featured during the evening was a Charleston contest. It was only a year or so later that the Pioneer's banquet room became history.

1964 was the beginning of the Equestrian Trails Patrol, a state group. Badge No. 1 was presented to Ray by former County Sheriff Earl Whitmore.

Perhaps one of the most outstanding events of 1964 was the Trails Boosters dinner dance held at the Mounted Patrol club house. The evening was also sponsored by the Mounted Patrol, Los Altos Hunt, and Menlo Circus Club. Attending the affair was Assemblyman Carl A. Britschgi and former supervisor Alvin S. Hatch. Alvin Hatch presented Equestrian Trails Patrol badges to sixteen new members. Speaker of the evening was Charles A. LeTurk, then Director of the State Department of Parks and Recreation. The event also marked the first public showing of a then new Walt Disney film, "Golden Opportunity." The fourteen-minute color film stressed the need for recreational facilities for California's booming population in order to preserve the granduer of the state.

So with the pleasant memories of the 1963 and 1964 years of the Association, let us wish Hank and Ray "Happy Trails.!"

TRUCK AND TRAILER MAINTENANCE

Tom Miller wrote a letter to the membership expressing the importance of regular and routine maintenance for trucks and trailers.

During the busy show season we spend much of our time keeping our horses "tuned up." We may overlook a very important aspect of horse showing ... that being our trucks and trailers.

Tom says to have oil changed every 2,000 miles in your truck. Truck and trailer brakes should be inspected periodically. The truck transmission should be reved every two years and your engine tuned once a year.

HUDDART PARK WUNDERLICH PARK

January 29, 1982

All trails in Huddart Park are closed for the remainder of the rainy season according to Jack Sumner, District Supervisor for Huddart and Wunderlich County Parks. This action was necessitated by a dangerous mudslide on Richard's Road Trail and extremely wet conditions throughout the park.

Because the trail between the cul-de-sac on Raymundo Drive and Greer Road is a vital link in the Woodside trail system, the reopening of that section of trail will have top priority with park staff.

Ranger Sumner advised horseback riders, hikers and joggers to use the trails in Wunderlich Park for the remainder of the wet season. The wide trails in Wunderlich Park from the public parking area on Woodside Road "The Meadows" and to Skyline to Boulevard are open to all use. The Bear Gulch Trail and the Redwood Trail are open only to foot traffic for the rest of the rainy season. The Madrone Trail and the Skyline Trail (Old State Trail) between Wunderlich and Huddart Parks are closed to all traffic. The popular Bear Gulch Trail will undergo major reconstruction this winder while horse traffic is restricted. All trails in Wunderlich Park and Huddart Park will reopen to horses when the trails dry out.

Ranger Sumner said that all restrictions are signed on the trails and that current trail conditions are posted on the bulletin board at the public parking lot at Wunderlich Park, 4040 Woodside Road, Woodside. The Parks Department rangers thank you for your patience and cooperation while we work together to minimize the effects of this disastrous winter.

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FAY HUMPHRIES SMCHA SPECIAL AWARD WINNER

Our Special Award this year goes to a member who came to San Mateo County by way of the Southwest and and San Joaquin Valley.

He grew up on a ranch on an Arizona Indian reservation, where he learned at an early age to handle horses and mules. It was while working on the Bear Creek Ranch near Modesto that he became interested in polo and started training polo ponies and learning how to stick-and-ball.

World War II delayed his equestrian activities while he saw active duty in the Air Force. He again served his country when he returned to the service as a staff sergeant during the Korean conflict.

He came to San Mateo when it was still "horse country" -- when there were still large training and boarding stables in what is now "downtown." It was here that he met his wife, Connie. They were married in 1948.

He and Connie were both early members of the Association and have always been active in its many phases. He served as member of the Board of Directors from 1970 through 1973.

Fay has been active in polo on the Pacific Coast since before the war. Over the years he has put on several polo pony exhibitions for our members and has conducted clinics for the Menlo Polo Club.

In 1975 one of his horses was the winner of the Best Playing Polo Pony Award at the Palm Desert tournament, where he competed against 150 of the best ponies from all over the country. He was also trainer of a previous two-time winner of a similar award at the National Open.

This man has been such a great force among polo players on the Peninsula that the Menlo Club has named an annual tournament in his honor. Fay is the man every other horseman comes to when he needs help because he's having a problem with his game or with his horse.

He is the elder statesman of polo players on the Peninsula ... Mister Polo himself, FAY HUMPHRIES.



PACIFIC COAST CUTTING FUTURITY

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The Pacific Coast Cutting Futurity held November 10-15, 1981, was won this year by Lindy Burch. Lindy was riding a filly named Teen-O-Leena. Teen-O-Leena is by Doc O'Leena and out of Ben's Velveteen.

Lindy Burch is the first woman to win the Pacific Coast Cutting Futurity (PCCF) in its eight-year history. Lindy is also the only woman to win the 1980 National Cutting Futurity in Fort Worth, Texas.

The PCCF consists of two preliminary cutting go-rounds, a semi-finals and a finals. The thirty high-scoring horses go into the semi-finals, and the fifteen best horses in the semi-finals go into the finals.

I would like everyone to know how lucky we are to have a fellow horseman in our midst. This horseman is none other than Lew Reed. Our dear Lew is on about every committee in this area. To name a few: Board of Directors, Woodside Trail Club; Town of Woodside Trail Committee; Board of Directors, San Mateo County Horseman's Association; Board of Directors, Los Viajeros Riding Club; Mid-Peninsula Trails Council; Woodside Planning Commission and San Mateo County Citizens Advisory Committee on Trails. Lew gave me the following report on the various jobs done: A three-foot width of blue rock has been packed down on the horse trail that runs along Raymundo Road. This alone cost \$4,811, while another \$10,400 was spent on repairing horse trails that go along the following streets in Woodside: Kings Mt. Road, Fox Hollow, some on Woodside Road, Mt. Home Road and Whiskey Hill Road. The town of Woodside paid for this out of the fund collected from each horse owner at the rate of \$12 per head per year. It is the responsibility of Woodside to take care of roadside trails. The Woodside Trail Club clears and maintains all interior trails at their expense under a 50-year contract with the town of Woodside. The County has assumed the duty of caring for the trail along Canada Road from Edgewood to Highway 92. They are employing Gene Sheehan (trail builder) to repair this trail. Lew hoped this work would start some time in November. Another bit Highway 92. of news: the County and a private donor have paid for 14 miles of brand new trail from Jack Brook Horse Camp to Butano Ridge in Pescadero Park. Ralph Donnelley, donated land to the town of Woodside for the purpose of a good trail. This is where the Dean Trail runs out of Huddart Park and crosses King's Mt. Road.

On the September SMCHA ride, Gordon Jennings had a mishap with a new horse. Gordon hurt his leg quite severely, but was up and around within a few weeks.

The President's Ride, held in late October, was a beautiful affair. Noel and Doug Moody set an excellent pace for a group of 42 riders. The weather was typical Indian Summer. John Olivier rode drag, did a perfect job closing all gates and keeping the riders together without even once falling off his Then horses and all went to Jim and Janet Esteps. Ross Meredith, who horse. everyone knows is boss of the Woodside Stables, has been riding and training horses in this area for over 30 years. Also a club member for 30 years, Ross joined us on the ride, his first, well ... it's about time, Ross! I heard him laughingly say, "I sure hope ... my horse ... don't get ner-r-r-r-vous." Some 60 people cleaned up on a dozen selections of hors d'oeuvres, then great hamburgers, salad and ice cream. You did a beautful job, Mr. and Mrs. Estep. 


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
